Who we help

Everybody deserves a good life. With our partners we are changing our communities.

United Way is creating opportunities for a better life for the people in Southeastern New Brunswick. Working with many community partners, we get at the heart of the matter. Our work and the work of the programs we fund are consistent with our values and principles and fall within our three focus areas.

From poverty to possibility

Poverty is a complex set of stubborn, intertwined social issues. United Way is one of many partners working to address poverty in a meaningful way.

Our communities today

Income can determine living conditions such as safe housing and ability to buy good food; it can impact our mental and physical health.

In 2011, the percentage of households in SENB earning less than \$20,000 ranged between 9% and 19%*.

That same year, median household incomes in our communities varied between \$41,000 and \$70,165*. Households in our urban core and those located in our more rural communities tend to be at higher risk for lower income.

@ Goal

To help individuals and families have adequate and affordable housing; have the ability to access nutritious tasty food in a dignified and sustainable manner; build the skills and knowledge to increase employability, earning power and financial assets.



Strategies

- Strategic multi-year investments in community partners fostering the development of essential skills in food literacy, financial literacy and educational opportunities that leads to employment.
- Partnering in efforts across the region that help move individuals from poverty to possibility, such as the At Home Chez Soi Housing First Research Project, the Westmorland Albert Food Security Action Group and our region's two Community Inclusion Networks.

All that kids can be

United Way focuses on children and youth because research tells us that this is one of the most powerful ways to address the root causes of social problems.

Our kids today

76% of our SENB youth have a positive view of their personal future yet only 36% know how to plan ahead and make choices**.

Less than 40% of our kids report receiving support from positive adult role models in our community and feeling valued by them**.

© Goal

To put kids on the path to success by investing in their development from early childhood to young adulthood — ensuring they have the opportunities they need to thrive and have a healthy transition to adulthood.



Strategies

- Strategic multi-year investments in community partners working to increase engagement in learning; connectedness and community involvement; and improve emotional and physical well-being in kids.
- Leading initiatives like All Star Coaches, Urban
 Neighbourhood Strategy and Youth First, which
 collectively work to develop and implement strategies
 and tools that help kids get the added support they
 need.

Strong communities

United Way works in a variety of ways to help individuals, families and communities build what they need to be resilient, to achieve personal goals and build vibrant and engaged communities.

Our communities today

For adults in SENB, the percentage of those who rate their sense of belonging to their local community as being strong or somewhat strong ranges between 63% and 77%*. Feeling connected to community is positively associated with self-reported levels of physical and mental health and can reduce the risk of poverty, obesity and poor school attainment.

© Goal

To connect people to formal and informal supports that help: develop life skills, positive coping strategies and to get involved with their community making neighbourhoods vibrant places to live and work.



Strategies

- Strategic multi-year investments in community partners providing counselling and support in areas of connectedness, personal safety and wellbeing for adults, seniors and persons with disabilities.
- Advance collective action efforts such as Community Inclusion Networks, the National United Way 211 initiative in New Brunswick and United Way Day of Caring.
- Invest in training and development for the community Non-profit sector to ensure effective and professional services that generate community knowledge to inform our work and change community conditions.

Thanks to the kindness of our donors and commitment from thousands of volunteers, \$2.285 million was raised during our annual campaign.

Campaign highlights:

- 72 companies in Southeastern New Brunswick had an increase in their employee giving campaigns.
- 9 new public and private employee giving campaigns came on board raising an additional \$10, 717 for United Way.
- The United Way of Greater Moncton and Southeastern New Brunswick Leaders (donors who contribute \$500 or more to United Way) raised more than \$616, 000 in the 2013 campaign.


Here's what some of our volunteers did in 2013:

- 600 volunteers participated in 48 United Way Day of Caring projects. A Day of Caring connects volunteers with an agency to complete one-day work projects. It's a great way for participants to learn more about the agencies in Southeastern New Brunswick, and to experience first-hand the impact of their contributions.
- 5 "loaned representatives" employees who are seconded to United Way acted as fundraising account managers leading volunteers and inspiring donors.

Progress depends on working together: coordinating our actions, measuring the same things and sharing what we learn. Acting together, we can change lives. By building capacity in the non-profit sector our agencies and communities are stronger.

Here's what we accomplished:

- In 2013, Andrew Taylor, PhD, and industry expert in program
 evaluation worked with United Way and agencies to build our
 understanding and ability to report on community outcomes. This
 will allow agencies and the United Way to report on specific
 changes in the community.
- In 2013, almost 6, 000 students grades 5 to 12 in both Anglophone
 East and Francophone sud school Districts participated in the
 Developmental Asset survey. The results let us know how kids in
 Southeastern New Brunswick are doing when it comes to the things
 they need to grow up healthy and strong to be resilient in tough
 situations. The results let us know that in the past three years our kids
 are doing better, but that there's still work to be done.
- In 2013 over 52 corporate leaders attended the Southeastern New Brunswick Corporate funders dialogue - Insight. Invest. Impact. The dialogue addressed maximizing the impact of social investments in our communities and was presented through a partnership between the three United Ways in New Brunswick, Mariner, Landal Inc., the Greater Saint John Community Foundation, the Fredericton Community Foundation, the Business Community Anti-Poverty Initiative in St. John and the Fundy Community Foundation.
- In 2013, the United Way All Star Coaches partnered with the Frye festival and participated in the kids' fest and readings by author Philip Roy. The All Star Coaches made reading contagious in four schools while sporting their moustaches and connecting kids with positive adults through Movember literacy mania. In October, our All Star Coaches joined over 100 other men in the city to take a stand against violence against women by walking a mile in her shoes.




